You are <u>not</u> getting a new Medicare card

January 2026

Scammers are using the new year as a way to steal your Medicare information. They may say that with the new year you need a new card.

Medicare does not send new cards every year,

In 2018, there was an update to Medicare cards. This update included removing a person's Social Security number and replacing it with a random identifier including numbers and letters. There is no plan to update it with new numbers or send out plastic cards.

Your Medicare card is a paper card with a blue banner across the top and a red banner across the bottom with your Medicare information in the middle.





Examples of Medicare Card Scams

Someone calls you claiming:



Medicare is sending out new, plastic cards.



It's a new year so you need a new card.



You need a black and white card.



Medicare is switching to a card with a chip in it.



They need you to verify your Medicare number so they can confirm you have the correct Medicare card.



🥕 They need your Medicare number to see if you have received your new one yet.

How to protect yourself

- Do not answer calls from numbers you do not recognize.
- Do not confirm your Medicare number or answer "yes" to any question.



Guard your Medicare card and number like a credit card! Don't share your number, laminate it, make copies, or let anyone else make a copy.
